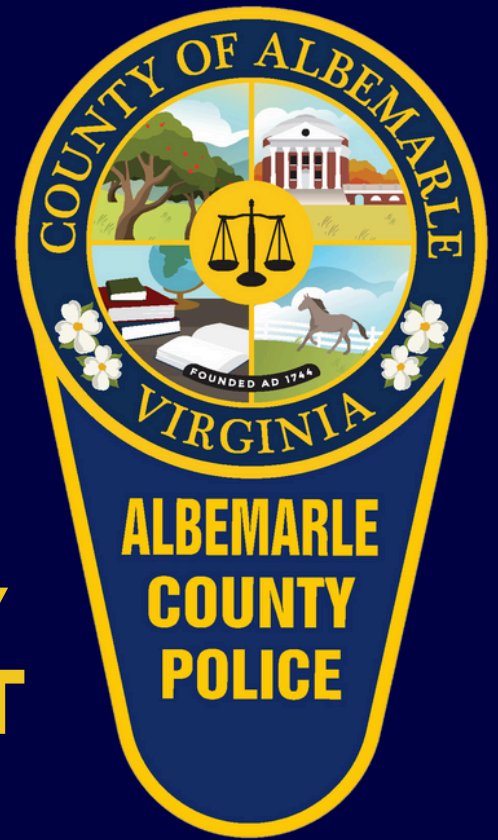

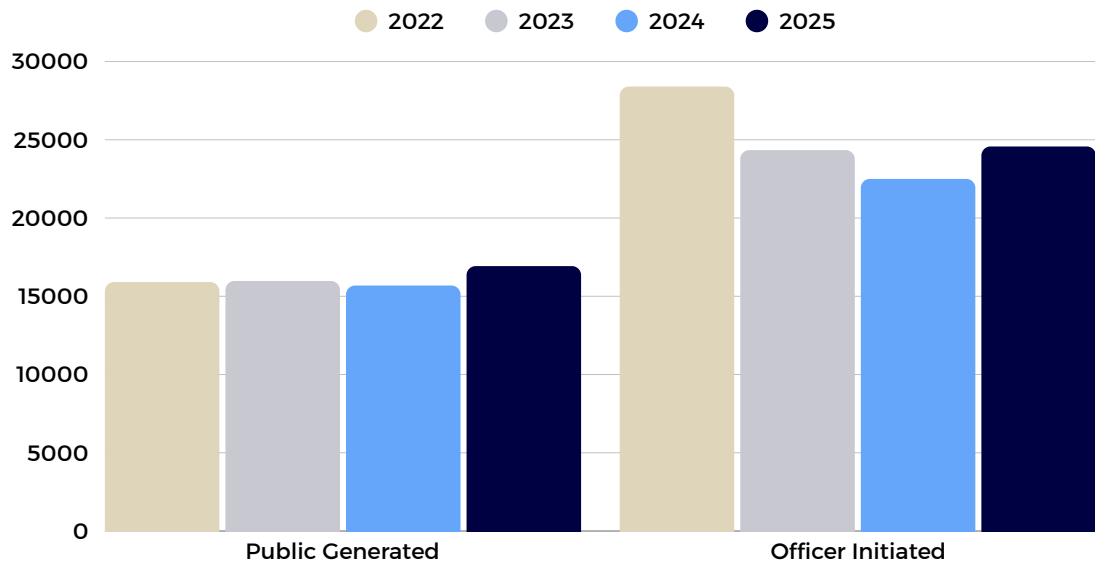

In the Community

Calls for Service

Total Calls for Service (CFS)

For the first half of 2025, ACPD responded to 41,498 calls for service in the community. Of these, 16,927 were ECC initiated, meaning the calls were generated by the public requesting assistance. The remaining 24,571 calls were officer initiated. Officer initiated calls for service include efforts such as extra patrols, follow-up investigations, house checks, traffic stops, and warrant services.

Priority 1 Calls for Service

Priority 1 calls include homicide, rape, aggravated assault, vehicle crash with injury, shots fired, calls involving a weapon, and officer needing assistance. The goal in responding to Priority 1 calls is five (5) minutes or less in urban areas and ten (10) minutes or less in rural areas.

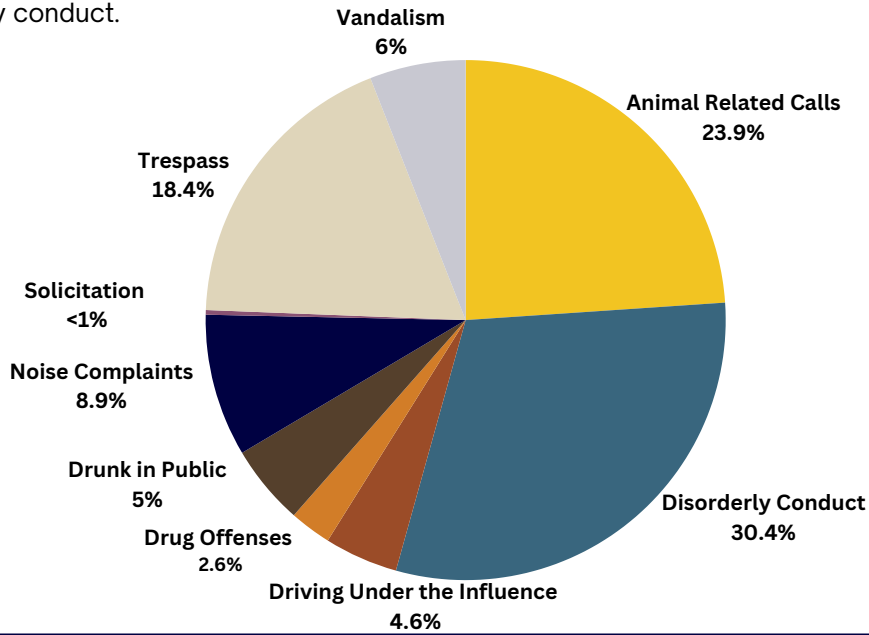
For the first half of 2025, ACPD responded to 341 Priority 1 calls in urban areas with an average response time of 4 minutes and 33 seconds. Of the 341 calls in urban areas of the County, 73% were responded to within the goal timeframe of under five (5) minutes.

For the rural areas of the County, ACPD responded to 102 Priority 1 calls for service, with an average response time of 11 minutes and 02 seconds. Of the 102 calls, 54% were responded to within the goal timeframe of under ten (10) minutes.

Quality of Life

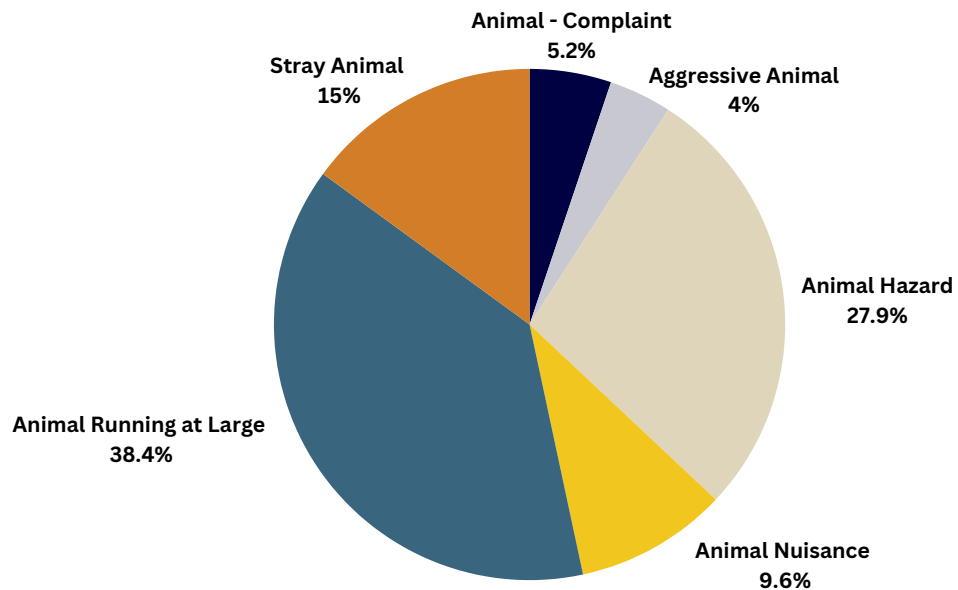
Quality of Life Concerns

Quality of life calls for service encompass minor, often nonviolent, incidents that disrupt a sense of well-being and public safety in the community. As seen below, three quality of life concerns (disorderly conduct, animal related calls, and trespassing) account for 73% of all quality of life calls for service with almost a third of quality of life calls for service being attributed to disorderly conduct.



Animal Related Calls for Service

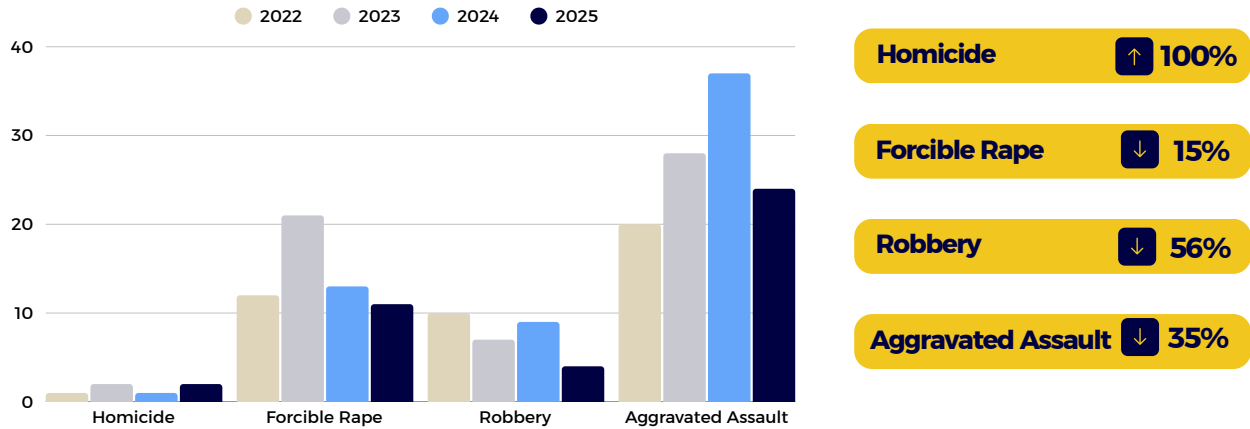

Part I Crime

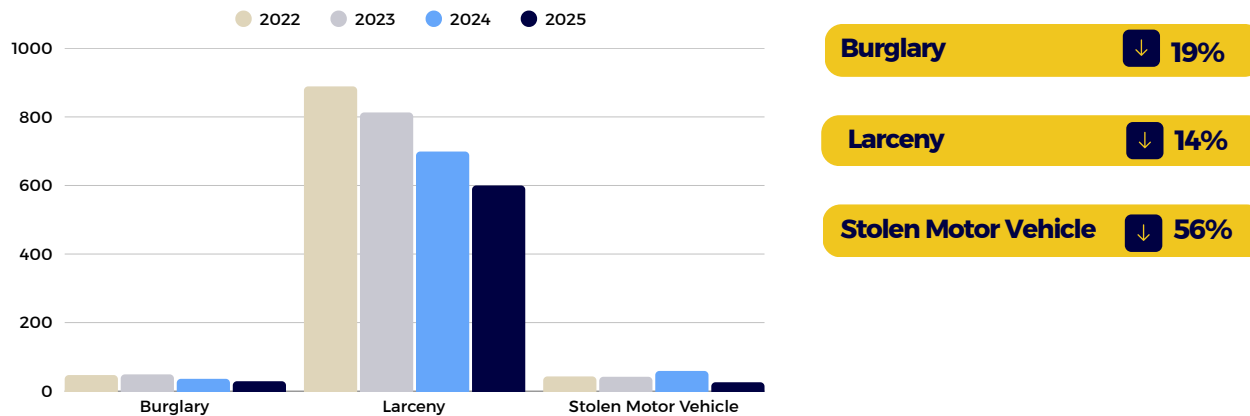
Violent Crime

Part I Crimes are serious crimes that occur throughout the country and are likely to be reported to police. There are two categories of Part I Crime: violent crimes and property crimes. Violent crimes include homicides, forcible rape, robberies, and aggravated assaults. The values for 2025 Part I Crime can be seen in dark blue below. Compared to the previous year (2024), **violent crime experienced a 32% decrease during the first half of 2025**. Violent crime saw a decrease in totality but did see an increase in homicides from one (1) incident in the first half of 2024 to two (2) incidents in 2025, thus causing a large increase in percent difference of 100%.



Property Crime

Property crimes include burglaries, stolen motor vehicles, and larcenies. Larcenies can be broken down into several categories such as pocket-picking, purse snatching, shoplifting, theft from building, theft from coin-operated machine, theft from motor vehicle, theft of motor vehicle parts, and larceny other. As seen in the chart below, **the first half of 2025 experienced a decrease in all property crimes** across the board with a 18% decrease compared to the midyear of 2024.

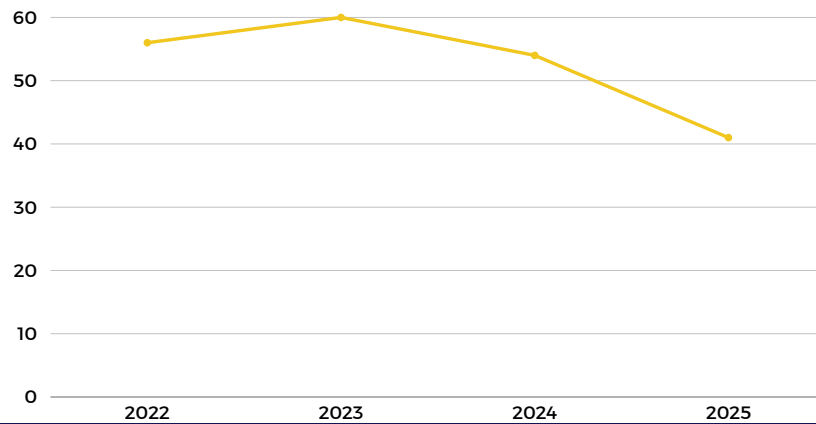


Gun Violence

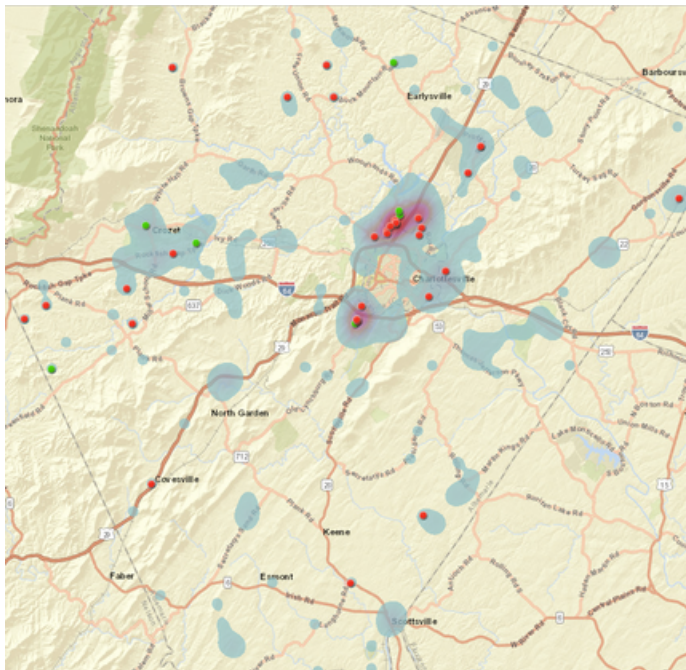
Regional CompStat

As a region, the Albemarle County Police Department, Charlottesville Police Department, and University of Virginia Police Department continue to meet on a monthly basis to tackle gun violence seen locally. The Regional CompStat focuses on the review of local crime trends regarding gun violence, such as calls for service related to shots fired incidents, aggravated assaults, robberies and homicides with a firearm, stolen motor vehicles, and stolen firearms.

The following line chart displays verified gun violence data for Albemarle County for the first half of 2022-2025. These values include verified shots fired as well as gun violence cases of aggravated assaults, robberies and homicides with a firearm. Thus far in 2025, there has been a **27% decrease in verified incidents compared to the three year average** and a **24% decrease compared to midyear 2024 in Albemarle County**.



Heat Map

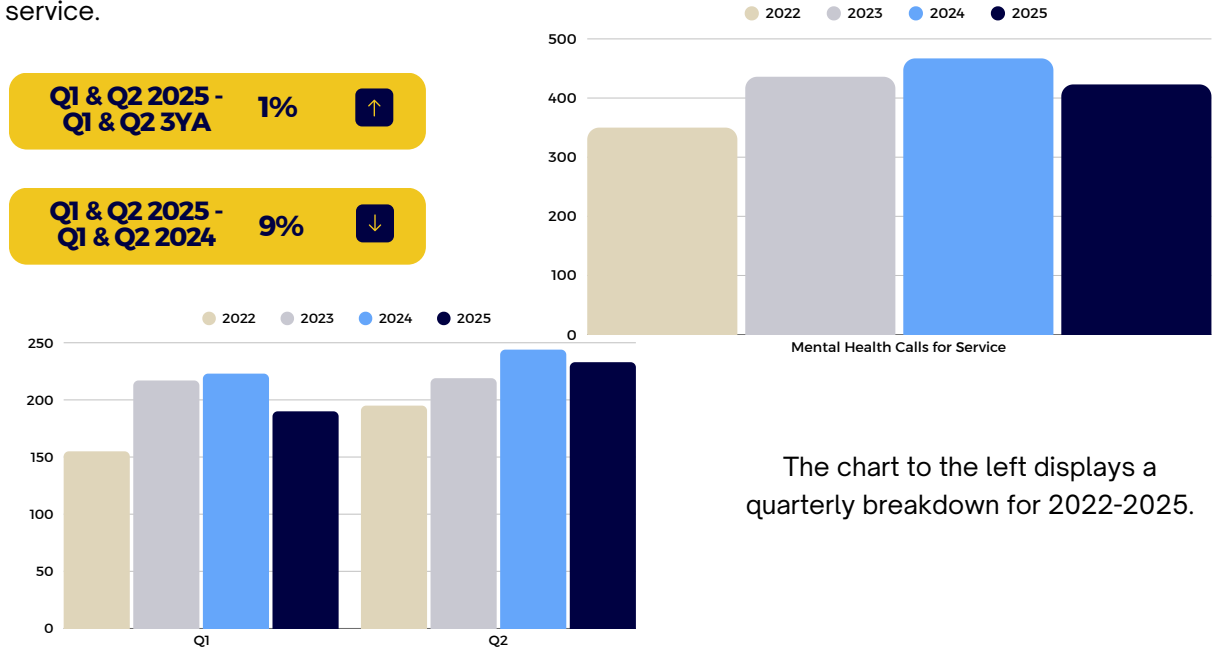


The heat map to the left displays the gun violence incidents experienced throughout the County from 2022-2025. These incidents include: verified shots fired and gun violence cases of aggravated assaults with a firearm, robberies with a firearm, and homicides with a firearm. The individual symbols (red circles) indicate the locations of only verified shots fired incidents whereas the green circles indicate verified shots fired incidents that could be related to hunting, target practice, or fireworks.

Mental Health

Mental Health Calls for Service

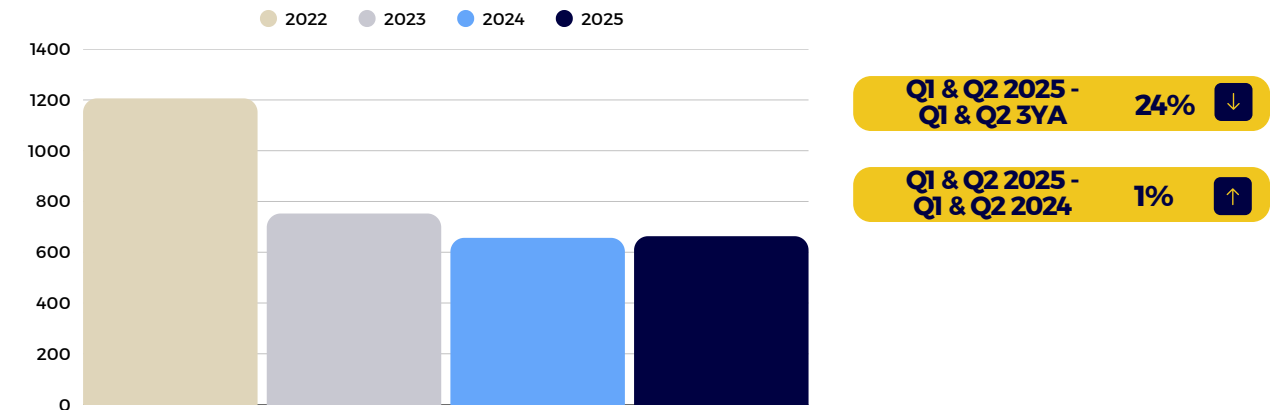
During the first half of 2025, ACPD responded to 423 mental health calls for service. These calls include assist citizen - mental person, temporary detention orders, and emergency custody orders. The first two quarters experienced a 1% increase in these calls compared to the three year average but, compared to 2024, 2025 has seen a 9% decrease in mental health calls for service.

Mental Health Calls - Time Spent

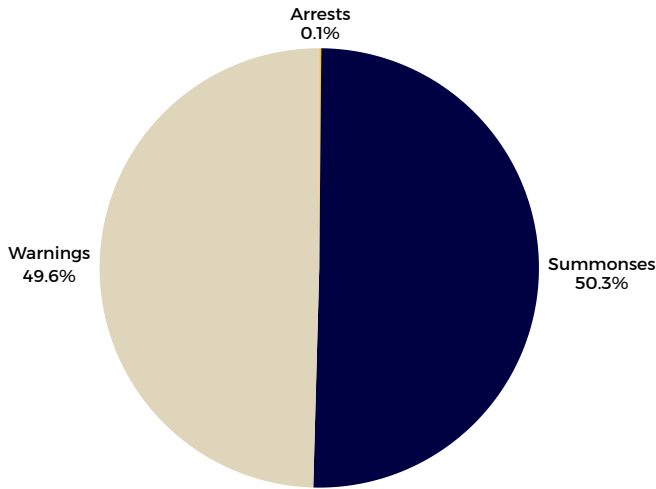
The following chart displays the time spent on mental health calls for service for the first and second quarter 2022-2025. 2025 saw a decrease of 24% compared to the three year average and a 1% increase compared to this time last year (first half 2024).



Traffic

Community Policing Data

During the first half of 2025, ACPD had a total of 4,707 traffic stops, resulting in 2,367 summonses issued. Of the 2,367 summonses, the top three violation categories were titling, registration, and licensure; speeding; and motor vehicle and equipment safety. The primary offense for motor vehicle and equipment safety is failure to have vehicle inspected.

Crashes

In total, ACPD has responded to 737 crashes in 2025. 35% of crashes during the first half of 2025 can be attributed to one of three identified target causal factors (distracted driving (16%), speed (13%) or alcohol (6%)). In addition, other causal factors include deer (4%) and cellphone use/texting (2%). The following are the top 3 roadways of concern for Albemarle County for the first six months of 2025.

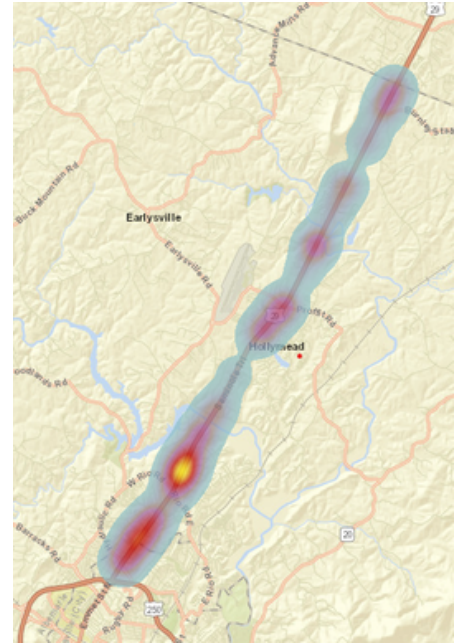
Additionally, in the first half of 2025, there were three crash fatalities - one being alcohol related, one speed related, and one unrestrained driver.

Traffic

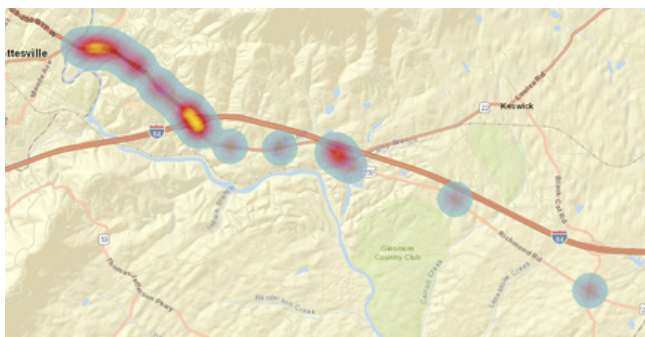
Seminole Trail

Seminole Trail continues to have the highest number of crashes for Albemarle County. There have been 126 crashes along Seminole Trail in 2025 thus far. Continuing from quarter one, roughly one-fourth of the crashes along Seminole Trail (23%) can be attributed to speed, distracted driving, or alcohol.

Richmond Road



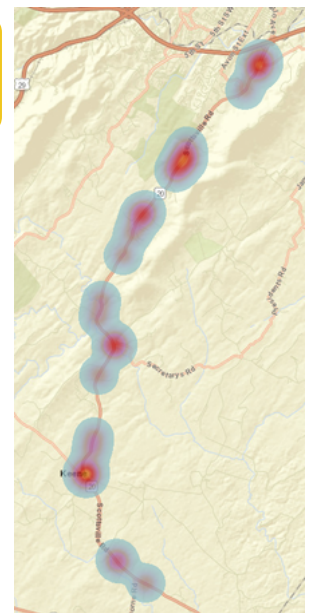
Richmond Road had the second highest number of crashes (36) for the first half of 2025. 39% of crashes along Richmond Road can be attributed to speed, distracted driving, or cellphone use. There have been no crashes along Richmond Road in 2025 that name alcohol as a contributing factor.

Scottsville Road

Scottsville Road had the third highest number of crashes (31) for 2025. 42% of the crashes can be attributed to speed, distracted driving, or alcohol. An additional contributing factor to crashes along this roadway include deer, which were involved in 16% of crashes thus far in 2025.
